Motions in limine are a tool used by the parties to focus the issues of a case before a trial begins. At times, these motions are also used during trial to avoid the jury hearing prejudicial testimony. This timely seminar will bring practitioners up to date on the recent rule change to Rule 4:25-8 and will also discuss best practices involving in limine motions, in light of the Rule change.

- Are all in limine motions filed before trial?
- Are filing of motions in limine mandatory?
- May an application be considered during trial?
